

# Primary Health Networks Implementation Guide Heavy Menstrual Bleeding Clinical Care Standard

At least 25% of reproductive age women experience heavy menstrual bleeding which can seriously affect their quality of life, and their physical health. Many of these women do not seek care, while others are undergoing hysterectomy to address their heavy bleeding, often without realising that effective, less invasive treatments are available.

The *Heavy Menstrual Bleeding Clinical Care Standard* (the Standard) aims to improve care for women with heavy menstrual bleeding and ensure they can make an informed choice about the most appropriate and least invasive treatment for their individual situation.

By supporting the dissemination and implementation of the *Heavy Menstrual Bleeding Clinical Care Standard*, Primary Health Networks (PHNs) will contribute to:

- More timely assessment and diagnosis of heavy menstrual bleeding and its underlying causes
- Better access to effective and less invasive treatments for heavy menstrual bleeding
- Greater opportunity for women to make informed decisions about their management
- Improved physical, social and emotional wellbeing of women with heavy menstrual bleeding.

| Multidisciplinary<br>education sessions | Use the <b>presentation for clinicians</b> to support a local education event.<br>Invite local experts to facilitate, such as a GP with special interest in women's<br>health and/or a gynaecologist. Incorporate information on local pathways and<br>services to increase relevance and engagement.   |
